RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A highly anticipated National Academy of Sciences report on uranium mining concludes that Virginia must overcome "steep hurdles" before it can assure that a rich deposit of the radioactive ore can be safely mined and processed. The 290-page report released Monday is expected to guide the 2012 General Assembly if it considers ending a 30-year ban on uranium mining. The report does not recommend whether the ban be lifted or remain in place, but makes clear the state must address a number of environmental and public safety issues before mining can occur. Virginia Uranium Inc. has proposed mining a 119-million-pound deposit in Pittsylvania County, near the North Carolina border. The so-called Coles Hill deposit is the largest known deposit in the U.S. and the seventh largest in the world.
